## EDITORIAL

### *By the President*

Dear members of ISAH, colleagues and friends,

Only half a year ago, we were still full of enthusiasm about our successful 19<sup>th</sup> Congress in Wroclaw and looked happily ahead to the Christmas vacations. In those days, top on the agenda of many institutions and farmers across the world from China to Europe was the battle against African Swine Fever (ASF). Hygiene principles and biosecurity measures were in the spotlight because neither a vaccine nor an effective medical treatment was (and is) available against this *Asfvirus*.

Since then, the world has changed by the emerging and very fast spreading SARS-CoV-2 pandemic that has also changed our professional and personal life dramatically. Students were sent home, teaching via internet developed quickly. Exams were postponed, meetings moved to telephone or video calls, travelling stopped, conferences were cancelled or postponed (as our ISAH Congress in Thailand) or reduced to a few online lectures. Since February and March, the SARS-CoV-2 virus dominates headlines and news. To date (4<sup>th</sup> July) WHO reports nearly 11 million people verifiably infected by the virus and about 520 thousand casualties worldwide.

Hygiene measures and biosecurity were suddenly top on the agenda of all hospitals and public health offices. Breathing masks, hand and surface hygiene, disinfecting and distance of at least 1.5 m between people were strictly ordered to interrupt the virus transmission from person to person. Hygiene and prevention were considered the only way to protect receptive people from SARS-CoV-2 and consequently from poor health



condition, sickness, suffering and death plus the impact on families and society, as long as neither medication nor vaccination are available.

This actual zoonotic SARS-CoV-2 pandemic reminds us (again) that humans are part of nature and that medicine and health care of the future must include animals and the environment – also addressed as the “One Health” concept - or, because of the earth's ecosystem, as “global health” or “planetary health”. Viruses, bacteria, fungi, protozoa and parasites can spread between animals and humans. A total of about 60% of all human infectious diseases and 73% of all new emerging human infectious diseases are of animal origin, often spreading from wild animals when their natural habitats are destroyed. The One Health concept requires therefore close collaboration between the human, veterinary, and environmental sector and partners like OIE, WHO and FAO. Most relevant areas of One Health are public health, veterinary public health, food safety, control of zoonoses, and combatting antibiotic resistance.

The current crisis shows that more research and better education is required in applied hygiene. Needless to say, Applied Hygiene is also a "cost-free protection" against other infectious agents and can save resources and lives according to our leading principle: **prevention is better than cure.**

Finally, I quote an information provided by our colleague and treasurer of ISAH Hermann Schobesberger recently at the occasion of the official 12th International Day of Hand Hygiene initiated by WHO and celebrated every year on 5<sup>th</sup> of May. A British study shows that before SARS-Cov-2 about 77% of Chinese, 70% of Japanese, 61% of all South Koreans, and 43% of Italians did not wash their hands after visiting a restroom. This – I am sure – has changed in the last 3 months worldwide.

Presently, not yet much is known about the role of domestic and farm animals transmitting Sars-Covid-2. Cats and ferrets can be infected and they can transmit the virus within their population. Also dogs can be carriers but transmission to other dogs and humans is not proven. Farm animals like pigs and poultry do not seem to be receptive for the virus and do not spread. A possible role of horse and cattle is still under investigation. Bats are assumed as the origin of the virus.

On January, Prof Hartung presented the first German - Brazilian animal protection book entitled “Animal Welfare in Brazil and Germany - Responsibility and passion” during the Green Week in Berlin (Grüne Woche 2020).

In the 304-page volume, there are 40 contributions written by well-known German and Brazilian authors on the protection of farm animals, horses, dogs and cats, fish, zoo and wild animals as well as on the history of animal protection, current legal provisions and the implementation of animal welfare by administrative structures. Also included are chapters on animal welfare in the veterinary curriculum incl. “skills lab” studies, the view of NGOs, media and industry on animal welfare issues.

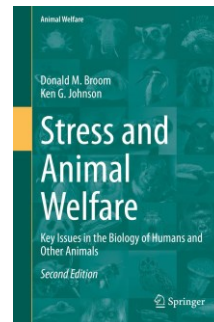

### *Stress & animal welfare – 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition*



Prof. emeritus Donald Broom and Prof. Ken Johnson edited the 2nd edition of 'stress and animal welfare'. This book explains the basic biological principles of coping with many forms of adversity. The major part of this work is devoted to explaining scientifically usable concepts in stress and welfare. A wide range of welfare indicators are highlighted in detail with examples being drawn from man and other species. The necessity for combining information from disciplines is emphasized with a one-health, one-welfare approach. This information forms the basis for a synthesis of new ideas. Among the issues covered are: - How brain and body systems regulate using feelings, physiological responses, behaviour and responses to pathology - Limits to adaptation - Assessing positive and negative welfare during both short-term and long-term situations - Ethical problems and suggested solutions.

This work encapsulates a very wide body of literature on scientific aspects of animal welfare and will thus prove a valuable asset for animal welfare scientists, psychologists, students and teachers of all forms of biology, behaviour, medicine, veterinary medicine and animal usage.
